About the Author

Easterine Kire, poet, short story writer and novelist, was born in Kohima, Nagaland. In 1982, she was the first Naga poet in to have her poetry published in English. Her novel, *Bitter Wormwood* was shortlisted for the Hindu Lit for Life prize in 2013 and in the same year, she received the Free Voice Award from Barcelona. In 2016, her novel, *When the River Sleeps* was awarded The Hindu Lit for Life prize.

Easterne Kire holds a PhD in English Literature from Poona University. She performs poetry, delivers lectures on culture and literature, and holds writing workshops in schools and colleges.
